### **Fish Committee-Hatchery:** Ray Marklevitz / Gord Smith

- Bruce Mallard needs volunteers to feed the fish in the hatchery. If you can help, please call him at 519 534-1274. THIS FUNCTION IS REALY IMPORTANT AND WE NEED YOUR SUPPORT!! .
- The Brown Trout eggs received, in January, have hatched with very few losses. SSA did not get any eggs this year. Ray has had discussions with the SSA hatchery manager and will discuss with the MNR the possibility of relocating these fish. BPSA members tonight agreed with this suggestion as SSA will be able to retain the fish for a longer period of time and the year and a half old fish will be stocked equally between the two bays if transfer is approved by the MNR..
- Currently on hand in the hatchery is 20 thousand Rainbow Trout. They will be stocked in the bay on Sunday May 3rd. We need 25 or 30 volunteers at the Oxenden falls at 9am to hand bomb them down the hill.
- The Rainbows were fin clipped on April 8th. They were then graded for size an the largest 10 thousand stocked in the bay
- Water flow is currently 20 gpm.
- A group has in the past week made 4 trips to Denny's Dam to collect this years eggs, with the great support of LHFC. They were unable to collect any eggs on the first two trips (fish were green) but were able to collect 50,000 yesterday and 80,000 today. Ray will arrange to collect the remaining required eggs on the weekend. The eggs collected Wednesday have a lot of dead eggs that must be picked by this weekend.
- Fay Welsh gave BPSA through Ray 2 complete rod and reel down rigger fishing poles that were her deceased husband Paul's. Brian Allen was the successful bidder in the silent auction on the rods. Ray will send a note of appreciation to Fay.

### **Fish Management Zones-13 Lake Huron-14 Georgian Bay Stewardship Councils:** Dennis Morrison

- Cory McNeil has accepted the hatchery assistant manager's function. Dennis is still trying to find a succession candidate for the hatchery manager's position.
- The OFAH sponsored hatchery managers meeting hosted by BPSA held on April 18th was a great success

with 26 attendees. The guest speaker was Matt from the Chatsworth hatchery. He had a presentation and computer program on handling and feeding of fish to maximize growth. The food was great and community living helped with the caterer. The attendees who were from all over the province thought that our hatchery was great.

- Dennis attended the Great Lakes Fishing Commission meeting held in Ypsilanti Michigan last month. He attended 11 presentations over the 3 days. There were really no good news stories on the health of the lakes and the bait fish population continues to be low. One presentation showed that Cisco (deep water chub) that were thought to live only a few years can live up to 23 years. Some Scandinavia countries are now starting use hatcheries to raise herring to be used as bait fish.
- The next FMZ meeting will be May 30th in Port Severn.

#### **OFAH report for BPSA May 2015** – Stu Paterson

1. Our zone H OFAH is giving financial support to the Sydenham Sportsmen's new program to encourage more women to get involved in hunting. Karen Donnelley an SSA member is getting help from our zone to run the daylong course at the SSA range this August. She has done similar courses in the K-W area. The idea behind the seminars is to attract inexperienced female shooters to hunting and sports shooting.

Karen plans on having volunteer/mentor SSA members on hand to guide the newcomers. She says her previous seminars were well received and she believes the 2015 session will meet a need in Grey-Bruce considering the fact so many women have been taking firearms training in

recent years. If this event is successful it is hoped there will be many more. Karen works as a technician in the nuclear waste management division at Bruce Nuclear.

#### **2. OFAH News Release** – MOOSE CRISIS -

Hunters bear burden of moose management restrictions  
Moose hunting in Ontario is undergoing a dramatic change. Despite a clear lack of public support, the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) has approved changes to the licensed moose-hunting season in Northern Ontario.



"We're disappointed that no alterations were made to the proposal to reflect the comments received from the public. The Ministry itself admits that the majority of public comments did not support the proposed changes," said Mark Ryckman, OFAH senior wildlife biologist. As part of the Moose Project, the MNRF recently proposed two significant changes to moose seasons north of the French and Mattawa Rivers. The first, to take effect this year in 2015, will prohibit calf harvest outside of a two-week period in October. The second change, beginning in 2016, involves delaying the start of the gun hunt by one week.

While the OFAH acknowledges that the moose resource is the first priority and that some Wildlife Management Units (WMUs) would benefit from a reduction in calf harvest, it argued that delaying the season has no scientific merit, and was not supported by the majority of stakeholders.



The OFAH also argued that a two-week calf season is overly restrictive and could result in crowding; poor hunt quality, and less flexibility for hunters.

The season changes come on the heels of drastic tag reductions for the second consecutive year.

“In 2014, adult validation tags were reduced by 18% provincially and the result was 6,000 fewer licensed hunters. In 2015, we are being hit with an additional 15% tag reduction, which will almost certainly result in many people hunting in another jurisdiction, or abandoning moose hunting altogether,” said Ryckman.

WMUs in Northeastern Ontario are suffering the greatest tag reductions, with units 30, 38, and 47 being hit the hardest. Each of those units suffered tag reductions over 80% from last year.

The OFAH has received a commitment from the MNRF to proceed with Phase II of the Moose Project, which will involve an examination of all factors that impact moose populations. “It’s time for the Ministry to start managing moose populations, and not just moose hunters. We expect the minister to follow through on his commitment, and turn a promise into action and results,” said Ryckman.

The OFAH will continue to insist on sound moose management that will generate the greatest benefit to the moose resource, while minimizing unnecessary impacts to licensed moose hunters.

3. The connection between climate change and the decline of moose in parts of northern Ontario is the focus of a new study by Trent University PhD candidate Meredith Purcell. She appeared at both the annual OFAH conference and the latest OFAH zone meeting to explain her project.

She’s asking hunters to volunteer small samples of moose tissue taken from across the province. Purcell is looking



at genetic markers that mutate quickly because their functions are tied to climate change.

Purcell hopes studying the moose DNA will explain why the animals are disappearing in so many parts of their range.

“Populations have been declining throughout Wisconsin, and now that has extended into Manitoba and we are just

starting to see similar effects in Ontario,” Purcell said. “So we see these populations that are declining, and some nearby are doing just fine. So we are trying to figure out why that is.”

Purcell said she is especially interested in getting samples from hunters in northwestern Ontario.

Meat samples about the size of a pinky nail is all that’s needed for researchers to do a wide range of tests. The meat is sent in a small vial supplied with a kit that Purcell sends out to the people taking part. I have handed out three sample kits at our latest BPSA meeting. 4. OFAH is closely watching this story about charges laid in relation to unmarked gill nets found in Lake Nipissing last summer.

On March 24, 2015 charges were laid in relation to the unmarked gill nets,” Jolanta Kowalski, Senior Media Relations Officer with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry reported.

She said the suspect was charged with wasting flesh of fish suitable for food (an offence under the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act, 1997) and for leaving decaying fish in a net (an offence under the Federal Fisheries Act).



“We appreciate the cooperation and assistance of the Nipissing First Nation in this matter. Since this matter is now before the courts, it would be inappropriate for me to comment further.”

Kowalski refused to identify the suspect and didn’t provide an explanation.

From June 7 to late August the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry officers pulled 13 abandoned nets from Lake Nipissing. Most of the nets contained hundreds of dead fish.

The first net was discovered on Lake Nipissing on June 7. The net had more than 200 rotting fish in it.

As the nets continued to be found in Lake Nipissing, community organizations and groups jumped on board to help and bring attention to the issue.

BAYSAR Search and Rescue joined forces with the MNRF

in the summer to help look for abandoned gill nets. The volunteer organization took five flights over the lake. The North Bay and District Chamber of Commerce and Lake Nipissing Stakeholders Association called for the arrest of person or persons responsible for gill nets after discovery of a fifth 200-foot net full of rotting fish floating in Lake Nipissing.

Nipissing First Nation put a stop to gill netting on Lake Nipissing last fall in response to concerns from its community members about the health of the walleye fishery.

Chief Marianna Couchie stated in a previous article that the band council closed down gill netting on the lake until spring when the recreational walleye fishing season opens. She said many people wanted Nipissing First Nation to close gill netting right down, however the band council opted instead for a temporary closure out of concern for community members whose livelihoods depend on the fishery.

5. A reminder that we are not doing deer any favours when feeding them in winter. In the state of New Hampshire the Fish and Game Department reported in March that 12 deer found dead were victims of well intentioned supplemental feeding.

They died from complications related to winter feeding. Evidence showed they died from a condition caused by a rapid change in diet.

The rapid change in their feed reduced the deers ability to properly digest food, and released toxins in their bodies that led to death.



6. OFAH President Glenn Rivard from Thunder Bay once again attended our latest zone meeting. He calls what he`s doing listening and learning. In the May Ontario Out Of Doors magazine Glenn talks about getting the business of OFAH done, doesn`t always mean loudly rocking the boat or shouting or demonstrating. He reminds us most of the federations successes stem from building relationships and working constructively with all levels of government and all stakeholders just as President Jim Martell has been doing on our behalf.



7. Our federation continues to ask turkey hunters to report their kills. The continuing drop in hunter reporting rates remains a concern. It is working with the MNRF on finding ways of convincing hunters to report. And our federation is pushing for a youth wild turkey hunt on the weekend before the regular season opener. Many states

and Alberta hold youth turkey hunts which introduce youth to conservation and increase hunting recruitment.
